I hope you all are enjoying a hot but relaxing and somewhat normal summer. You deserve it! First of all, I am so proud and honored to serve as your President of the Auxiliary. As Jose Diaz-Balart says at the end of every news broadcast "thank you for the privilege of your time"; and truly I say that to all our volunteers. You put in countless hours without hesitation and always with smiles and boundless energy! As a result, the auxiliary was able to honor our commitment to donate \$182,000 to Frederick Health at the end of June. Of this donation, \$127,000 goes to complete our pledge to the BHU renovations and \$55,000 towards our \$1 million pledge to ReEnvisioning Critical Care. Special thanks goes to Pam Schaffert, Linda Allen, Sharll Hane, Joe Collins, Pat Ray, and ALL the volunteers who made this possible.

I hope that this letter finds you well and that you're making time during these warmer months to enjoy whatever it is that brings you joy and happiness. As we reach the midpoint of 2022, there are several exciting updates, awards, and milestones that I would like to share with you.

In May, Frederick Health celebrated our 120<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Our founder, Emma Smith, could have never envisioned the growth of our organization - from a single hospital with a dozen beds to a network of 22 facilities and 4,500 team members. I am grateful that for nearly 70 years of our history, the Auxiliary has been an integral part of our shared story.

In the same month, our organization was named one of the 100 Best Hospitals in the Nation and #1 in Maryland for Stroke Care by Healthgrades America, a premier healthcare ratings agency. This prestigious award is a testament to the hard work, talent, dedication, and commitment to excellence that is so common throughout Frederick Health. We have also won numerous other specialty awards from Healthgrades that can be viewed at www.frederickhealth.org/healthgrades.

We are also expanding our presence in the community in some exciting ways. The new state-of-the-art \$46.7 million-dollar Critical Care Expansion at the hospital, which includes a new Adult Emergency Department, Pediatric Emergency Department and inpatient unit, Intensive Care Unit, and Cardiac-Cath Laboratory is slated to open in September of this year. I am so very proud to say that our team members have donated over \$535,000 towards this new expansion. In addition, the Auxiliary have graciously pledged \$1 million dollars towards this project. Thank you so very much for your ongoing commitment to this community.

In addition to the expansion at the hospital, our new Frederick Health Emmitsburg location is scheduled to open in August of this year. This facility will offer Primary Care, Urgent Care, Laboratory, and Physical Therapy & Sports Rehab services. The driving force behind these great expansions is our commitment to the community we serve. As Frederick County continues to grow, we will continue to increase and enhance our services.

Finally, with your help, our organization continues to play an active role in combating the COVID-19 pandemic. We are still providing vaccination and booster clinics throughout the community, and I encourage you to get your boosters if you have not done so already. While we may have grown accustomed to living with COVID-19 in our daily lives, the virus is very much still present and impacting all of us. As summer ends and we move into the colder months, we stand ready to respond to whatever comes next and I take great comfort in knowing that the Frederick Health Auxiliary stands ready as well.

We are so lucky to live in a region that offers a variety of outdoor activities and history. Just yesterday, we went to Gettysburg for the afternoon. If you have not been to the Visitor's Center and Book Store, you really should make plans to go. On Thursday, June 23, we were able to get a "sneak preview" of some of the new construction areas. These new areas are scheduled to open on August 8<sup>th</sup> with the new ICU to open on August 22 and the new Cardiac Cath Lab to open sometime the first week of September. These openings don't mean the end to the construction. Once these new areas open, there are renovations to be made to the existing ED Blue and Green zones and the current Cath Lab space. The construction fencing, etc. will shift to the east, making the parking on the east side of the hospital (near the park) all parking for the ED patients and visitors. The entire construction project is scheduled to be completed in December of 2023 so we have a long way to go yet.

Thank you for your continued support of the hospital and the auxiliary. Your patience and flexibility during COVID and construction have been wonderful and greatly valued. Your time and efforts are noticed and appreciated by everyone – patients, visitors, staff, and physicians.

## **Treasurer's Letter**

I'd like to take some space here to share information about the Frederick Health Auxiliary's funds—how we raise them and how we spend them, as well as the rules we must follow as set by our bylaws.

The Auxiliary has 3 bank accounts: one is the **General** account which is managed by the Treasurer at the direction of the Board of Directors, one is the hospital **Gift Shop** account which is managed by an appointed Assistant Treasurer and the shop Chairperson. The third account is for the **Select Seconds Thrift Shop**, managed by that shop's Assistant Treasurer and Chairperson. The balance of these accounts is reported to the Board each month. Frederick Health Finance oversees all these accounts for us and makes all payments and transfer of funds for us at our direction.

The General account is divided into three separate subaccounts: **Operating**, **Fundraising** and **Scholarship**. This issue I am focusing on our **Operating** sub-account. Often, members ask why they are being required to "pay to volunteer", and sometimes asked to pay their way for events they may not have had to in the past. Per our bylaws, dues and any miscellaneous/unrestricted donations are the sole resource for our Operations expenses. NO funds raised by any other manner may be used for operations; they must go to fundraising for Frederick Health or our Scholarship Fund. Operating funds are used for expenses related to the general operational functions of the Auxiliary including uniforms, patches, awards, postage, etc.

Membership has slowly declined over the past several years, and subsequently our Operating income. We keep our budget as lean as possible, and at the same time try not to eliminate any important areas of need. To put this in perspective, our Dues income for the Fiscal Year 2021-22 was \$3,040 (budgeted \$4,000). The prior year, our budget was \$4,300 and we received \$4,097. Prior to that, our dues income was in the upper \$4-5 thousand range, and we had more people joining the Auxiliary. Bottom line: we need more members!

The monthly financial statements, budget and monthly meeting minutes are all available to peruse in the Volunteer Office after the next scheduled Board meeting, August 20<sup>th</sup>.

July is known as Ultraviolet Safety Month . Most skin cancers are caused by too much exposure to UV rays from the sun .

Although these outcomes sound scary, there are important steps that you can take to protect yourself.

#### Seek Shade

You can reduce your risk of sun damage and skin cancer by staying in the shade under an umbrella, tree, or other shelter.

#### Wear a Hat

For the most protection, wear a hat that has a brim all the way around that shades your face, ears, and the back of your neck. A tightly woven fabric, such as canvas, works best to protect your skin from UV rays.

#### Wear Sunglasses

Sunglasses protect your eyes from UV rays and reduce the risk of cataracts. They also protect the tender skin around your eyes from sun exposure.

### **Cover with Clothing**

When possible, wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants and skirts, which can provide protection from UV rays. Clothes made from tightly woven fabric offer the best protection.

#### **Use Sunscreen**

Put on broad spectrum sunscreen that has an SPF of 15 or higher before you go outside. Sunscreen wears off. Put it on again if you stay out in the sun for more than 2 hours and after swimming, sweating, or toweling off.
